As a church community, we look forward to further conversation with you about you interest in being baptized. This Guide is intended to be a tool to help you learn about faith, baptism, and communion as you grow in discipleship in Christ.

ABOUT BAPTISM AND COMMUNION

As a church, we love to celebrate baptism and communion as the outward signs of what God has done and is doing in the hearts and lives of our people. Baptism and communion are the two "sacraments" of the church. Sacraments are rituals instituted by Christ to be practiced in the church as visible signs of an invisible saving grace. This workbook is designed to help you understand these sacraments.

Our process is broken up into three steps:

UNDERSTAND

We want all who celebrate the sacraments to have a good grasp on what they are doing and what the signs are symbolizing. To that end, you will find:

- A Guide to help you work through the relevant scriptures pertaining to baptism and communion.
- Frequently Asked Questions to help you better grasp some of the ways we as a church think about and celebrate these signs.
- Help with Next Steps including some questions to guide you in thinking about what God has done in your life and how to articulate it and move forward.

MEET

Schedule a time to meet with a pastor. This meeting is intended to be an encouraging opportunity to rejoice in what God has done in your life! It will provide time to:

- Discuss the workbook and any questions you may have.
- Share stories of God's work in your life!
- Discuss the nuts and bolts of celebrating your baptism on a Sunday.

For those learning about communion, we would also invite you to connect with a pastor if you have any questions.

CELEBRATE

Personal declaration of faith honors our Lord, encourages the family of God and creates a personal marker for yourself as you celebrate and publicly acknowledge what God has done for you by grace through faith alone in Jesus Christ.

- For those being baptized, schedule a time to celebrate this sacrament on a Sunday.
- We celebrate communion weekly in our services.



UNDERSTANDING BAPTISM



What is Baptism?

The word "baptism" comes from the Greek word baptisto, which means "to dip" or "to immerse." Baptism (along with communion) is one of the "sacraments" of the church. Sacraments are rituals instituted by Christ to be practiced in the church as visible signs of an invisible saving grace. Baptism is an act of obedience to Christ. It is for those who identify with the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus for the forgiveness of sins. Baptism is a new believer's public declaration of personal faith in Jesus Christ alone for salvation.

What Does the Bible Say?

In this section, you will be guided through several passages of scripture relating to baptism. We invite you to pray and ask God to speak to you through his Holy Spirit as you study his word. We have provided some answers to each question at the end, but our hope is that you will investigate these for yourselves first, and then consult the suggested answers provided.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS:

- Q. Why don't we practice infant baptism?
- A. We don't baptize infants who are not old enough to understand the truths of the gospel and the significance of baptism. We believe that baptism is a celebration and declaration of a person's faith in Christ and decision to follow him as a disciple. We understand that for many people who grew up in different faith traditions, this can be cause for uncertainty and questions. Our pastors and elders would be more than happy to discuss this with you.
- **Q**. Should I be baptized again if I've been baptized before?
- A. Once you've been baptized, the answer is generally, "No." A person should be re-baptized if they have studied the scriptures and believe their previous baptism to have been unbiblical.
- **Q.** What if I received believer's baptism, but it wasn't a meaningful experience to me personally and I want to be baptized again now?
- A. Again, the answer is no. The Bible does not teach that baptism is a way of rededicating your life to the Lord or as a response to a particularly emotional experience of God. So, if you have trusted Jesus as your savior and have made a public profession of your faith in baptism, then you never again need to be baptized.

*Suggested Answers:

- What do the following verses teach us about baptism?
 Baptism is an act of obedience to Jesus's command, and follows his example.
- 2. What do these verses say about the symbolism of baptism? Baptism is like a picture—it symbolizes Jesus' death, burial and resurrection, and a believer's identification with those truths. In other words, when you first trust in Jesus, you "die" to the old life and are raised again to new life through the power of Jesus that now works inside of you. When you go under the water and come back up, you are reenacting the way Jesus died and was raised again on the third day. It also symbolizes the washing and cleansing from sin that you received when you put your trust in Jesus.
- 3. What does baptism have to do with being part of a church? It is a symbol of our entrance into the body of Christ, the Church. Baptism brings us together with the whole Christian family, both at SBCC and all around the world.

 Jesus' followers have been doing this since the very beginning! The sacrament of baptism is intended as a one-time public testimony of faith in Christ. It is a significant celebration and marker of faith for the new believer who commits his or her life to follow Christ and live for him. By participating in the sacrament of baptism one is vowing before God and the church to live for Christ. To come forward to be baptized is, therefore, a weighty decision that reflects personal understanding of the significance of this vow.



UNDERSTANDING COMMUNION

What is Communion?

Communion in an ongoing celebration in the church. Believers who trust Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior profess their faith, their ongoing spiritual need and gratitude for Christ by participating in this sacrament. The name communion conveys our union with Christ and our unity with one another experienced in this shared meal. The Lord's Supper, another name for communion, conveys that this meal was prepared by Jesus as a gift to us. The Eucharist, yet another name for communion, comes from the Greek word for thanksgiving. Communion is then our celebratory, spiritual-thanksgiving meal.

What does the Bible say?*

In this section, you will be guided through one of the clearest passages in scripture relating to communion. We invite you to pray and ask God to speak to you through his Holy Spirit as you study his word. We have provided some answers to each question at the end, but our hope is that you will investigate these for yourselves first, and then consult the suggested answers provided.

Read 1 Corinthians 11:23-29

- Who is communion for?
 Look again at verses 23-26. Who is Paul addressing? And who is Jesus addressing?
- 2. What does communion symbolize?
- What is the purpose of communion?
 Look again at verses 24-26. What do we do when we celebrate it? (For more on this, see also Matt. 26:26-28;
 Luke 22:19-20)
- 4. How do we prepare for communion?
 Look again at verses 28-29. What are we to examine and discern?



*Suggested answers:

- 1. Who is communion for? Communion is for all people who trust Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. We come forward together to participate in God's grace for us. It is a communal meal. We are not taking credit for what we do by coming forward; rather, we celebrate and honor what Christ did and accomplished for us on the cross.
- What does communion symbolize? The bread symbolizes his body and the wine symbolizes his blood, which were given for the forgiveness of our sins. By eating and drinking, we declare our need for the gift of his sacrifice for us.
- 3. What is the purpose of communion? Jesus instructs us to remember and proclaim him through communion, and to continue to do this until he returns again.
- 4. How do we prepare for communion? We must examine ourselves before participating in communion. This meal should not be celebrated without thought to whether or not we believe. Additionally, we can confess our sins, our need for God, and our participation in his Body, the Church.

WHAT IS THE CONNECTION BETWEEN BAPTISM AND COMMUNION?

Both are sacraments: gifts of Christ to be celebrated by those who believe and have been born again into new life in him. Both declare our need for and trust in his death and resurrection on our behalf. Both are acts of obedience, symbolizing our union with Christ and commitment to him. Both are outward symbols of an inward work God has done in us.

Baptism is a personalized and public profession of faith that symbolizes death to the old life and being raised to new life in Christ. Christ calls each of us as individuals to be baptized only once. A personal vow made in baptism before God and his church reflects one's faith, personal commitment and inner gratitude for grace and hope found only in Christ.

Communion also celebrates our faith in Christ and symbolizes our ongoing and daily need for him at work in our hearts. Christ calls his church to frequently participate in communion together in remembrance of his saving work on the cross. Communion reminds us of his ongoing grace and forgiveness in our lives as individuals and together as his church family.

Given the significance of both sacraments and the symbolism of each, we believe it makes sense for baptism to logically come before communion. If you have questions about this please speak with a pastor or elder. We want to be supportive and helpful to you and any questions you may have.

Consider what you believe and have learned from the Bible Does this accurately describe you?

- 1. Because Jesus Christ is my Lord and Savior, I want to be his disciple. The Holy Spirit gives me the desire and ability to do this.
- 2. I need a savior. I have a fallen, sin nature that keeps me from relationship with God. I cannot earn his love.
- 3. The good news is that God is loving, all-powerful, just and holy and he freely offers me justification, adoption and hope in his Son, Jesus.
- 4. All of Scripture points to Jesus as my needed Lord and Savior through his perfect sacrifice, death and resurrection. Jesus is both fully God and fully man. He saves all who love, obey and trust him.
- 5. My faith is a gift from God. I express my gratitude and faith by living for Christ.
- 6. I understand baptism and communion as public expressions of my desire to keep growing in my faith and honoring Jesus Christ with my life.
